Physical Separation and the Holy Eucharist

Love is something you can't do in the abstract. You can build buildings in the abstract. You can plan cities and even fight wars in the abstract. But as any lover will tell you, you have to love *concretely*.

Love isn't just an idea or a feeling. Love is concrete actions of receiving and giving. We "do love"— by biting our tongues when we want to win an argument; listening when we want to speak; making breakfast or doing the dishes when we'd rather be served; getting the yard work or the housework done; making phone calls to show we care; "gentling" the tone of our voices when talking about something we disagree about; and so on. You get the idea. In countless big and little ways like these, even without knowing or thinking about it, we "do love" all the time. The common denominator of loving concretely is giving and receiving something good, not merely for our own good, but for a greater good than ourselves alone.

God is Love —and so God loves us always and everywhere. But God especially loves us *concretely* in the Holy Eucharist, making us part of the "mystical Body" of Christ, one with Him and with one another. In the Holy Eucharist, God promises that our sins are forgiven, and gives us a share in the new life which transforms us both now and beyond the grave. We, in turn, receive and give our love back to God concretely by remembering, believing, and thanking Him for all He has done, and for all He is doing to make us more like His Body in the world.

Separated by social distancing from our congregation, kept apart from our friends and relatives and the rest of the world, separated even this morning from the Body and Blood which is consecrated at St. Mary's altar, are we still together as the Body of Christ? Are we still in the "mystical Communion of His Body and His Blood"? Does God feed us when we can't receive the host? Is God's gift of Jesus, His life and love in this Eucharist in the concrete, or in the abstract?

Anglican and catholic tradition teach us that when we open our hearts in faith to believe in God's promises and receive the Real Presence of Christ's Body and Blood at the altar under the physical signs of bread and wine, we will receive God's inward and spiritual grace, and feed on Him both physically and spiritually. But when we can not receive Him physically at the altar, we can still feed on Him *spiritually*, and still receive inward and spiritual grace. Whether we are fed only spiritually, or physically and spiritually, we "feed on Him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving." God always feeds us with His love when we believe in Jesus and His promises.

As usual, Jesus said it best: "Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for bread, will give a stone? ... If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give good things to those who ask him!" (Mt. 7:9,11)


Or as St. Augustine said, "to believe in Christ is to eat the living bread. Those who believe, eat. They are invisibly fed, because they are invisibly reborn."



Ezekiel 37:1-14

The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know." Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the Lord."

So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

Then he said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am

going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. And you shall know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the Lord, have spoken and will act," says the Lord.

Romans 8:6-11





The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

John 11:1-45

Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." But when Jesus heard it, he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was.

Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?" Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because they see the light of this world. But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them." After saying this, he told them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him." The disciples said to him, "Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right." Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. Then Jesus told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead. For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him." Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him."

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home.

Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary, and told her privately, "The Teacher is here and is calling for you." And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him. Now Jesus had not yet come to the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. The Jews who were with her in the house, consoling her, saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see." Jesus began to weep. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him. *After the Gospel, the Priest says*

The Sermon

The Prayers of the People

All remain standing.

Confident that with our hearts set on the glorious act of redemption revealed by God's beloved One, we receive the gift of new life, we offer our prayers and respond, "Kyrie eleison."

That the arms of Christ will reach into our spiritual tombs, releasing us from the fires of sin and division, or death and despair, and set our eyes upon the eighth day of our inheritance; (silence) let us pray.

People **Kyrie eleison.**

That the breath of God may rush into the hearts of the faithful, filling them with respect for the wisdom of their forebears, and the courage to walk where their feet had never trod; (silence) let us pray.

People Kyrie eleison.

For the unemployed and those who live with financial anxiety as we navigate this desert time, for children born into poverty and those whose wealth does not buy contentment, for those in troubled marriages and the lonely who suffer in silence, that all may be held by the risen Christ, who broke through the walls of darkness; *(silence)* let us pray.

People Kyrie eleison.

For those who are on the front line of this medical emergency; for doctors, nurses, and hospital workers; for truck drivers, grocery store workers and package delivers; for small business owners; and for those who are adhering to social distancing directives at great personal cost; *(silence)* let us pray.

People Kyrie eleison.

In thanksgiving for our life together even as we are currently separated, our persistence in listening to the divine word, and our commitment to proclaim the life-giving love of God; *(silence)* let us pray.

People Kyrie eleison.

That we who celebrate God in this worship may receive the mercy of the Lamb, who shares our burdens, removes our sin, and restores us in the company of the faithful; *(silence)* let us pray.

People Kyrie eleison.

For those who have died in the faith of Christ, especially John Noble, Sr. on the anniversary of his death this week, that they may reside in paradise; (*silence*) let us pray.

People Kyrie eleison.

In the certain hope of the resurrection from the dead; let us continue our prayers remembering those who are sick (*congregation reads the name aloud*) **Jennifer, Irene, Lisa, Judy, Patty, Mary, Jack, Betty, Brenda, Carl, Victoria, Genevieve, Ted, Gwyna, Lois, Nhu, Margaret and Jim** and any other special intentions which may be added at this time either silently or aloud.

(silence) let us pray.

All glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption; who made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. **AMEN**.

And now, as our Savior Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say, People and Celebrant

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses,

as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation,

but deliver us from evil.



The Gifts of God for the People of God.


From Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, A Prayer before Spiritual Communion
